The past two weeks have been busy ones with students completing start-of-year assessments in reading, writing and maths and with new routines being established in each class. Last Wednesday we held an earthquake drill. After the all clear was made we gathered together out on the top playground. We were quickly able to account for everyone. I was especially proud of the students who were having a PE lesson outside with Jonny. They children made themselves into turtles out in the playground.

We really appreciated having the opportunity to meet with whānau last week at our Meet and Greet evening. In the senior school Ray and Esther talked with parents and caregivers about how they can support their child being safe online and when on social media. They reminded parents about how they needed to be aware of what their child was accessing online and what they were posting in group chats.

Over the course of this week classes have visited the Whare Waka on the waterfront to learn about our early Māori local history. Their guides have shared with them the purakau (stories) of Kupe's arrival, Ngake and Whaitaitai, and the story behind the waka in the Whare Waka which is linked to Parihaka and to the Taranaki region.







The trip down to the Whare Waka was interesting. Writing poetry on the waterfront helped us to tune into where we were – the sounds and what was around us. I learnt that every waka is different. Each waka represents a person and through the carvings they express that person. – Sarah









I discovered that the two eyes on the waka are for navigation purposes. The waka could hold 16-18 people. The carvings on the waka were explained to us. The bow of the waka was, in war, used to ram other waka. The canoe was decorated with albatross feathers. This was linked to Parihaka. — Veer

Our Year 5 and 6s are getting very excited about next week's honey harvest. Martin, our mentor beekeeper feels certain we will have a bumper harvest.

I chose to use yellow and black which I think of as colours of the bee. We have to complete three practice labels before we create our final ones. House of Science Kits

Students in Rūma Pohutukawa had an exciting science session with Esther and Ray on Wednesday afternoon using two of the experiments from the Nano Chem kit.

I'm enjoying that we are getting new things to learn each time we do an experiment. - Ali

We created flubber by combining blue glue and borax. We used a popscicle stick to slowly blend the glue and borax solution. The flubber we made was jiggly. It felt nice and cold. It was both stretchy and squishy. I think you could even use the flubber as a stressball. – Alex and Lexi

The science kits make learning science fun. – Anh

We used two liquids to make a solid. We created flubber which is quite slimy to hold. I think we may have added too much borax to our glue because my flubber is a bit too liquidy. — Sione







Everything about the science kits is fun! I like how we had to measure an almost perfect tablespoon to make our crystals. We had to be so exact in our measurements. We are expecting to take five days for our crystals to grow. – Dezon

It was so much fun making crystals. The whole process of crystalisation is exciting. It's really good how each kit has all the scientific equipment we need for each experiment – petrie dishes, beakers and test tubes. – Selva



We did an experiment this afternoon to see how healthy our local stream Waimaphi is.

Anna collected the water from the stream at lunchtime. We tested the temperature of the water. It was OK because the temperature was between 10 -20 degrees celcius. The water clarity was poor. It was quite dirty. We don't think it would be good for drinking as the water had sediment in it. We looked at all the information we had gathered and decided that the stream was in OK health. — Thea and Tova (Nīkau scientists).
