# News from the Principal's Desk

Tena tatou katoa e te whanau. Dobar dahn, Nabad, Hola, Ciao, Ni hao, Namaste, Talofa, Bonjour, Konnichiwa, Kia orana, Bula, Buon giorno, Guten Tag, Cześć, Salamu Aleykum, Hola, Ciao, Haye, Hallo, Merhaba, Akkam, Asalaam-walaikum, Selamat datang, Walang anuman

In the past week we have welcomed Vivian, Rowan and Rome to our school community. Vivian and Rowan have joined Eva and Serah in Rūma Tawa. Rome has joined Ella and Levi in Rūma Kauri. We have also recently welcomed Lola, Jack and Ella to our support staff team.

On Thursday I accompanied five of our students to the renaming of Epuni Street to Hōniana Te Puni Street. A new street sign was unveiled by Wellington City Council, Wellington's mayor Tori Whanau, Wellington Central MP Tamatha Paul, and direct descendants of chief Hōniana Te Puni.







The street's new name honours Hōniana Te Puni, a rangatira (chief) of Ngāti Tāwhirikura and Ngāti Te Whiti hapu of Te Āti Awa. Hōniana was one of the leaders of the hekenga (migration) from Taranaki to the greater Wellington region. It was great for Dazelyn, Marina, Naomi, Kathrina and Marley a small group of students who live in this street to witness the new street signage being unveiled by Eru Walker Love a former student of Te Aro School. Eru, now a Year 12 student at Wellington High School, is a direct descendant of Hōniana Te Puni. Eru is currently supporting our kapa haka group on a Thursday afternoon each week.



#### **Attendance**

The Government has set a new regular attendance target of 80% of students being present at school for more than 90% of the term. The Government is working towards this attendance target by 2030. In Term 4 2023 the Ministry of Education had attendance data for 2,278 schools. Only 2% of schools had 80% or more students attending regularly. Half of the schools had between 50% and 70% of students attending regularly. Almost 40% of schools had less than 50% of students attending regularly. In Term 4 2023 we had 65% of students attending 90% or more and 22% of students attending 80 -90%.

We have just received from Every Day Matters our Term 1 attendance data analysis. During Term 1 of this year 65% of our students had regular attendance. 140 students had regular attendance (90% or more). 24% of absences were irregular absences where students had five – nine days absent during the term. This accounted for 51 students' absences. 6% of absences were considered moderate absences. Twelve students had moderate absences. Students in this absence category had between 10 - 15 days absent over the course of the term. During Term 1 52% of absences were due to illness. 22% of absences were due to holidaying.

School reports for students in Years 2-8 will be going home to families this coming Thursday. Your child's report will note if we have a concern about their attendance.

### **New Zealand Music Month Assembly**

Last Friday afternoon the senior classes celebrated New Zealand Music Month with an assembly in Ruma Pohutukawa. New Zealand Music Month is held in May each year and we have celebrated it as a school for a great number of years. Assemblies like last Friday's one is a chance to celebrate New Zealand music and the musicians who perform it. At our assembly we heard Linden, Margaret, Patrick, Yoyo, Oscar, Melody, Jaime and Izy sing and perform. It was great to have both current students and past students perform. — Dazelyn, Anh, and Marina











### **City Gallery**

Last Monday students from Ruma Manuka visited the City Gallery. They went in two groups to the gallery and each group did a printing workshop with Mathew (one of the gallery educators).

Before we did our workshop we did a tour of the exhibition called Turbo Croc 2.0 by artist Ahsin Ahsin. I liked the first room we went into. It was based on Greek pots. The artwork was really unique. I really enjoyed making the stamps. We created our own designs – an animal or whatever we wanted to create. We used printing ink on our stamps. We brought back our stamps to school after we had cleaned them. – Daisy

#### News from the Garden













With Claire, our new beekeeper, we made wasp traps last week. We wanted to learn about bee predators. We had seen wasps around our hives. We had seen that our hives have robbing screens on them to stop wasps getting into the hives to eat the bees and the bee larvae. In pairs we researched about wasps and varroa mite. We looked online for trap ideas and we looked at YouTube videos. We made our bottle traps from the resources Claire had brought in with her.

Using used plastic bottles we made traps to attract wasps into them and away from our hives. We put a little lemonade into each bottle in the hope that the wasps would come into the bottle to drink this sweet liquid. The wasps can smell the lemonade. It didn't take long for us to catch our first wasp. Minh's trap caught a wasp in just over an hour. The wasps flew into the bottles but they couldn't fly out.
